**Jack Kloppenburg** is Professor in the Dept. Community and Environmental Sociology at the Univ. of Wisconsin-Madison. He is Co-Director of the Center for Integrated Agricultural Systems, and Director of the GreenHouse Residential Learning Community. He is also affiliated with the Nelson Institute for Environmental Studies and the Agroecology Program.

His research has examined movements for “food sovereignty,” the social impacts of biotechnology, the emergence of managed grazing networks, global controversies over genetic resources, and the use “open source” principles in the biosciences. His work on the “foodshed” concerns sustainable food systems based on integration of local/regional food production into local economies.
