



<p>Thurs. March 23rd Lab Sciences 300, 5pm w/Nhial Tutlam Sudanese Refugee</p>  <p>In Western Sudan's Humanitarian Crisis, 400,000 people have been killed and 2 million have been displaced. Join us for an art exhibit of drawings made by children in these refugee camps interspersed with photographs from the Darfur Region.</p>	<p>Wed. March 29th Rebstock 215, 7pm w/Prof. Shanti Parikh Anthropology & AFAS</p> <p>More than 50 women, men, and young people from across the globe and from all walks of life share their experiences related to the HIV/AIDS global pandemic. The film discusses the underlying causes of AIDS; the relationship between health, dignity, and human rights; and the universal need for action, compassion, and commitment to counter what has become the worst plague in human history.</p> 	<p>Wed. April 5th Friedman Lounge, 7pm w/Prof. Jane Aiken WU School of Law</p>  <p>This documentary profiles survivors of human trafficking in locations across the U.S. highlighting their passion for freedom and justice, for themselves and for victims of human trafficking world-wide. Maria was enslaved for sexual exploitation, "Miguel" was violently forced into farm labor, and Rose kidnapped from Cameroon and enslaved as a domestic servant.</p>	<p>Tues. April 11th Louderman 458, 7pm w/TBA</p> <p>"Turtles Can Fly" is a feature film that portrays a Kurdish refugee camp through the story of a clan of courageous children on the eve of the U.S. ~ Iraq war. The devastation to this land and its inhabitants is revealed in the matter-of-fact perspective of the children and their struggle to survive.</p> 	<p>Thurs. April 20th Rebstock 215, 7pm w/Prof. Derek Pardue IAS & Anthropology</p>  <p>Haunted by the murders of his family and many of his friends, Anderson Sá is a former drug-trafficker who turns social revolutionary in Rio de Janeiro's most feared slum. Through hip-hop music and Afro-Brazilian dance he rallies his community to counteract the violent oppression enforced by teenage drug armies and sustained by corrupt police.</p>	<p>Thurs. April 27th Rebstock 215, 7pm w/Prof. Meredith Woo-Cumings Univ. of Michigan</p> <p>As many as 300,000 North Korean refugees have escaped political repression and widespread hunger at home and are currently living illegally in China. Refugees forcibly returned often face grave human rights abuses. A group of activists have created a network of safe houses and escape routes to help North Korean Refugees find amnesty.</p>
